Ontario Breast Screening Program (OBSP) Expansion to People Ages 40 to 49

On October 8th, 2024, the Ontario Breast Screening Program (OBSP) expanded to offer breast cancer screening for eligible people starting at age 40. People ages 40 to 49 should talk with their family doctor, nurse practitioner or a Health811 navigator (phone 811) to make an **informed decision** about whether breast screening is right for them. The screening modality, interval, and eligibility criteria for people ages 40 to 49 is the same as for people ages 50 to 74.

OBSP Eligibility:

Women, Two-Spirit people, trans people and non-binary people ages 40 to 74 are eligible for screening through the OBSP if they:

- have no new breast cancer symptoms
- have no personal history of breast cancer
- have not had a mastectomy
- have not had a screening mammogram within the last 11 months
- if transfeminine, have used feminizing hormones for at least 5 years in a row

How Can People Book an OBSP Appointment?

Eligible people can <u>self-refer</u> and book their own mammogram appointment by calling an <u>OBSP location</u> directly, or they can be referred by their primary care provider.

Notification of OBSP Screening Results:

Normal Result	Abnormal Result
 People will receive a normal result letter with their breast/chest density information and recall interval in the mail from Ontario Health (Cancer Care Ontario). 	 If someone has an abnormal screening result, the OBSP location where they were screened may help coordinate a timely follow-up appointment for further investigation.
The patient's primary care provider will receive the screening result report.	 The patient's primary care provider (if attached) or an OBSP designate (if unattached) will be notified of the abnormal result and may be asked to help facilitate further investigation.
